
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THE WAY WE WERE

This month we are going to hear from Jinx Gunville, the first recipient of the AMSC Lifetime Achievement Award, who has been breeding Miniature Schnauzers since 1957.

Jinx started her career in dogs with a Great Dane. She bred and showed Danes from 1950 until she got her first schnauzer in 1957. She never finished her Championship but she inspired a love for the breed that continues to this day. Jinx's foundation dog was Ursafel/Helarry breeding and went on to become Ch. Amigo of Merry Maker. He carried the black and silver gene and appears in some of the pedigrees we see today, waaaaayyy back Her best known Mini was CH Merry Makers Dyna Mite, strongly bred on the Helarry Line and handled for Jinx by by Mr. and Mrs. Bob Condon.



Asked how things have changed, Jinx says, "Quality has improved. Movement is better. Grooming is an art. There were more benched shows when I first started showing. Exhibitors sat in the benching area waiting to be released and discussed dogs. One could learn a lot listening to these discussions."

On the issue of health, "Any health issue that several people have encountered in their breeding programs becomes a problem. I personally dealt with urinary problems and pancreatic problems."

How has the breed changed? "There has been great improvement in Blacks and Black and Silvers. In general, there is more uniformity of type and better movement. You seldom see strictly a pet Miniature Schnauzer in the ring today. (I can remember clippered Miniature Schnauzers being seen in the ring



at Montgomery KC!!!!!) I think it is time to start concentrating on having banded coats on our S/P and eliminate the smutty colored furnmishing. The two color varieties are equally competitive in the ring today. Let's stop interbreeding these colors as extensively as we are not doing."

I have spent much time mentoring people applying to judge the breed, usually at National Specialties.

I love the breed and I have many long time friends who are still actively breeding and showing. I live with one Mini "Jazz" and try to attend Great Western every year.

Thank you Jinx, for you insights!!

- 2. Thanks to the Chicago MSC for supplying equipment for members flying into the Cluster. It is a great idea and very well executed. Thanks to Marge Moenter for coordinating.
- 3. A huge thank-you to the Miniature Schnauzer Club of So. California once again for manning our "Meet the Breeds" booth at the AKC/ Eukanuba Invitational show in December. From all I heard it was a great representation.
- 4. AKC will be sponsoring a "Meet the Breeds" in NYC on October 17, 2009 and has requested our participation. We will be re-using, as much as possible, the SoCal booth.

- 5. My attempts to get AKC to allow us to use the studbooks for a pedigree database have been unsuccessful. However, I would like to still move forward with implementing a Pedigree DB into our website. There is a proposal to use a member's current DB and appointing a committee to keep the DB updated. This will be discussed under New Business. Details of how it will work will be in one of the next AMSCopes and announced on AMSC-I, if approved.

- 5. AMSC Fall Specialty Was held in conjunction with the Montgomery County Kennel Club on Sunday, October 5, 2008. Ms. Sue Baines judged 25 sweepstakes entries. Mrs. Carole Weinberger judged 97 regular class entries.

Report of the Treasurer: Sharon Edwards (See chart above)

Budget vs. Actuals - 2008

Income for 2008 was \$1.1k (3%) favorable to budget mainly due to a shortfall in membership dues offset by a favorable variance in special events, especially the 2008 roving specialty in Portland. Expenses for the year were \$4.4k (10%) unfavorable due primarily to two large unplanned expenses the purchase of 150 specialty medallion trophies for \$5k and sterling silver 25 year membership pins for \$1.8k. Other material variances relate to donations, which were \$4.6k less than plan, and specialty events expenses, which were \$4k over plan. Travel expense also contributed to the expense overage, resulting in a \$2.5k overage, largely due to judges' travel. We ended the year with a net loss of \$3.2k compared to a breakeven plan.

Considering this was our first annual plan, this was a great effort.

Budget - 2009

The 2009 budget has been shaved a bit compared to 2008. This is due to the economic forecast, which seems to deteriorate regularly. Income is down \$4.3k (10%) and expenses down \$7.7k (16%) compared to 2008 actuals. Membership is projected to be lower by about 50 members based on the current number of non-renewals. Barring any material unexpected expenses and continued worsening of the economy, this is a conservative budget. Note that expenses for an agility/obedience show is included the numbers.

2009 Dues

Final dues notices were mailed USPS Feb. 2 to about 100 members who had not paid as of that date. The membership will likely decrease from 600 to 550 members this year. There are currently 80 members who have not renewed their memberships.

IRS Guidelines

Tax guidelines for a Section 403 c(7) non-profit organization provide that we may be audited just as a for-profit organization. Given this fact, providing complete documentation for expenses is imperative. Please remember to save your receipts and submit them in a timely manner for reimbursement.

FROM THE AKC....

Canine health remains a top priority for AKC, its parent clubs, and all responsible breeders. In that report I outlined the resources available to the responsible breeder from a variety of sources such as the AKC Breeders' Department and the AKC Canine Health Foundation (AKC CHF). I also highlighted parent clubs' initiatives contributing to the continued good health of purebred dogs.

AKC has created a new online Canine Health Resource Center at: www.akcdoghealth.com. This comprehensive website pulls together the latest in canine health research news, access to major health registries, archives of educational podcasts, newsletters and articles, and links to find the latest information about genetic tests available to help eradicate diseases in dogs.

The site has been organized into several sections including one devoted to AKC CHF and one to the major canine health registries - the Orthopedic Foundation for Animals (OFA) and the Canine Eye Registration Foundation (CERF). Responsible breeders depend on these online research tools when selecting animals to include in breeding programs. Additionally, the Canine Health Information Center (CHIC), listing participating parent clubs, specific tests, and screening results for an even wider range of genetic tests, can be easily accessed from this new site.

#### AMSC NATIONAL SPECIALTY - CHICAGO 2009

I would like to sincerely thank the American Miniature Schnauzer Club for the honour of judging one of their National Specialties. I was aware that I was the first 'Brit' to be afforded this honour but no one at the show seemed to recall anyone from outside America having previously judged a 'National' thus it was an even more special honour and one that I will always consider to be the pinnacle of my judging career.

Having said all of that, the honour came at a price and that price was the passing of Lanny Hirstein, who was the first choice judge for the day. Lanny was someone who had always been extremely kind to Peter (Newman) and I over many years and Penlan Pleased To Meet You, who Lanny & Penny sent to the UK, played an important part of our breeding program. It was a very special honour to take over his judging assignment.

I outlined what I am particularly looking for when judging, following my assignment at Hatboro' and, as it was printed in Schnauzer Shorts, I will not re-visit it here. The critique below is intended to give an idication as to why dogs beat others on this particular day.

#### PUPPY DOG 9-12.

#### 1. Repitition's Impresssion

Stood alone in the class but is a quality baby, making a good, typey outline. Masculine head, good for bone and pleasing in fore-chest, he has a deep, well-ribbed, well-coupled body. I would have preferred him just a shade tighter in elbow but I liked the flow of his neck into a good topline, with a correct tail set completing the picture. I found his quarters developing nicely and good rear angulation. Presented in a harsh B/S coat, he moved soundly and his movement was the deciding factor in awarding him Winners Dog.

#### AMATUER-OWNER-HANDLER DOG

Absent.

#### BRED-BY EXHIBITOR DOG

#### 1. Attaway Blue Light Special

A quality boy with a pleasing head and lovely well-ribbed body. I found pleasing width between his front legs but I would have preferred a little more fill in with his fore chest. He pleased in topline and coupling and has good rear angulation and neat hocks. Presented in a good S/P jacket, there was little to choose between the first two in this class, with the winner moving a little better. However, when it came to the challenge he was no going nearly as well and so had to be content with Reserve Winners Dog.

#### 2. Wards Creek In The Nick of Time

Another good one of correct type. Pleasing in head, he has a lovely fore-chest, is nicely angulated front and rear and has good

for body depth, but not quite the ribbing or coupling of the winner. Good in neckline and topline, I would have preferred truer movement up and down. Presented in a good jacket and held his outline well on the move.

#### 3. Minuteman All About Fly Fishing

A nicely balanced boy in a good S/P jacket, who displayed a very impressive profile going round the ring. However, on examination I found that I would have preferred more ribbing and bone, a better fore-chest and better out and back movement.

#### 4. Jam's Like No Other

Another nicely balanced dog that made a typey outline. However, I found him also lacking in the substance I was looking for and would have preferred him more masculine.

#### **PUPPY BITCHES 6-9**

I found this a difficult class to judge as I would have preferred a little more substance on the first three. I fully appreciate they are only babies but the 4th did have the substance I was looking for but sadly disappointed in other areas.

#### 1. Wards Creek's Business As Usual

This one pleased in head and was the best of the first three for substance and body depth. She is developing nicely with her quarters, has pleasing angulation and moved OK.

#### 2. Sathgate Black Watch Grand Finale

A beautifully presented bitch, making a lovely outline and in a nice tight S/P jacket. I liked her head proportions, the flow of her neck into her topline, angulation and lovely quarters. Pity she didn't have a little more substance and a little more breadth between her front legs.

#### 3. Myla's Love Never Fails

This girl pleased for angulation and in fore-chest but disappointed in head properties and colour. She needs to firm up in topline.

#### 4. Blackwitch Solor Spike

A typey bitch that made a pleasing outline standing and although he had th substance I was looking for, I am afraid her front construction prevented me from placing her higher.

#### **PUPPY BITCHES 9-12**

#### 1. Char N'Co Life In The Fast Lan

A pretty headed bitch with a nice eye. She has a nicely ribbed body of good depth and a prominent breast bone. Pleasing neckline, topline and angulation, good quarters and a particularly pleasing second thigh. OK for

coat and with neat hocks, she moved freely. I would have preferred a little more bone and a shade more between her front legs.

#### **BITCHES 12 - 18**

#### 1. Mystique Amalfi's Charlie's Angel

A typey bitch with an acceptable head, good body depth, acceptable coupling and a prominent breast bone. I would have preferred a shade more bone, tighter elbows and a little more fill in with her fore-chest. Good for her topline, nicely angulated and with particularly good quarters. Presented in a good black jacket, she moved soundly when viewed from all angles.

#### AMATUER-OWNER-HANDLER.

Two nice ones in this class with the younger giving way to the maturity of the winner.

#### 1. Blackwitch Keep Sake

A pretty headed bitch with a lovely wellribbed body, good fore-chest and pleasing width between the front legs. Good in topline, quarters and with neat hocks. Moved OK.

#### 2. Slam Dunk's String Music

A pretty bitch of pleasing type, beautifully presented and nicely handled. She wasn't quite as settled on the move as the winner but I like her a lot and hope she has a successful future.

#### **BRED BY EXHIBITOR BITCHES**

#### 1. Ward's Creek's Luck Be A Lady Tonight

#### 2. Minuteman Madrid

Two very nice bitches headed this lovely class, both exuding breed type and moving well. Very little to choose between them but I just preferred the coupling and for-chest of the winner.

#### 3. Destineez Dream Catcher

Another quality bitch with a good body, topline and quarters. Free moving and in a good jacket, her neckline did not quite flow into her topline as those above her.

#### 4. Tomar's Just Dream'n

Similar in type to the one above but not having quite the maturity and as I see that there is only a few months between them, I guess this is a slow mature that moved soundly out and back today and looked her best on the move in profile.

## OPEN BITCHES – BLACK, INCLUDING BLACK & SILVER

#### 1. Hardinhaus Sparkle And Shine

Judging this bitch gave me a great deal of pleasure and if I were not a S/P specialist breeder, this is the one from the classes that I would have liked to take home. When I first looked at her I thought her legs may be a little short but on examination found that excessive under fringe masked correct leg to body pro-

Nicely balanced bone and with a good fore-chest in prominence, depth and breadth, she has a lovely flow of her neck through well placed shoulders into a good topline. Good quarters, rear angulation and neat hocks complete the picture. Presented in a B/S coat of good colour and texture, she moved well when settled. Winners Bitch & Best of Winners.

#### 2. Destineez High Roller

Another nice one that I particularly liked for her substance, body and fore-chest, topline, rear angulation and quarters. However, not quite the head of the winner, not the flow of neck into shoulders, where a goodly amount of hair filled in and moving a little close behind.

#### 2. Repitition's Jolee's Dream Girl

Two quality bitches in this class, with slightly differing heads but each in balance with her body. Both had pleasing expressions and were good for body, bone, forechests, quarters, angulation and neat in hock. Very little to choose between them but I just found the winner a little better made in front and she held her topline a little better on the move.

#### 3. Tejas Whodunnit

This bitch disappointed in her head planes, was not in the best of coats and was not showing or moving well today.

#### **BEST OF BREED**

The quality in 'Specials' classes is always a reminder of why the rest of the world looks to the U.S. for the lead in Miniature Schnauzers and this year was no exception. Of course there are some that look lovely standing, only not to fulfil that promise on examination or on the move but having judged Specialties all over the world I only find quality of this depth in the ILS

This time I felt that Ch Lonestar's Wicked Good and Ch Ward's Creek Nightly Bisiness stood away from the rest and they just happened to be a bitch and a dog respectively. Each had all of the essentials that I was looking for and both were moving soundly. Although the bitch could have been a little clearer with her colour I found her a little better coupled than the boy and so I went for Ch Lonestar's Wicked Good for BOB and Ch Wards Creek Nightly Bisiness BOS.

My first Award of Merit went to Ch Awesomes Kiss My Gritz, who appealed a lot but lacked the maturity and finish of those above him and my second AOM went to Ch Carmel Race To Kelvercrest, who is one that I have seen before and was on really good form today.

In 2008, the AMSC Health Committee set up and launched the Miniature Schnauzer Canine Health Information program. The Canine Health Information Center (CHIC) is the AKC Canine Health Foundation's health database and DNA repository designed to facilitate owners listing dogs who have been screened using certain phenotype and genotype testing as well as being a DNA source for canine breedspecific research. It is the hope of the health committee that over time, owners and breeders will submit Miniature Schnauzer samples and data to CHIC so we can begin to build a valuable health registry. One goal of our enrollment in CHIC is to begin the data collection our breeders need to make educated breeding decisions and in time build a strong database where we can not only collect information on healthy dogs, but collect and store data and DNA on a number of health defects for our breed by utilizing the DNA Repository available to us as a CHIC member club. While we have not seen progress in reporting so far, it is our plan to begin a strategy to provide more and consistent locations for testing as well as recognition to those who participate during the upcoming year.

On the other hand, there was significant progress regarding the DOGenes marketed DNA test for Juvenile Renal Dysplasia. We have appended a <u>thorough</u> discussion of our JRD deliberation with genetic pedigree and recommendations which will provide a more in depth discussion for the board. Briefly, we have included some discussion points as follows:

The current testing results for the mutation in Miniature Schnauzers reveal:

Total # Dogs Tested 165

Total # Dogs Homozygous (affected) 147

Total # Dogs Heterozygous (Carrier) 15

Total # Dogs Homozygous (Clear) 3

The AMSC Health Committee does not know for certain if the mutation being tested for is, in fact, responsible for JRD or whether it simply plays a role, but it is clear that there is a "pocket" of dogs which possess a "rare" allele which seems to be extremely limited and is presently isolated to one family of dogs. This single fact alone warrants continued testing to identify dogs which carry this rare allele. Preservation efforts are extremely important until we know exactly what this allele does. Therefore, the Health Committee encourages continued testing for the purpose of identifying the distribution of this allele across the population. However, as a management tool for breeding programs, breeders are discouraged from using this test to remove animals from your program until more information is available. Current information reveals that the ravages of renal disease may not even be apparent until at least 75% of the kidney function is lost. This further complicates our ability to make an ordered and educated statement as to whether JRD is as prevalent as would be implied by the DNA test results until more is known. We strongly recommend complete diagnostics on dogs suffering from renal compromise, including a post-mortem exam and a renal wedge biopsy as this is the only method to definitively diagnose JRD. It is imperative that we as a breed determine the prevalence of JRD in our overall population as well as to establish a database of disease affecting our breed. In order to ensure that a representative sample is analyzed, the Health Committee is asking that any deceased miniature schnauzer over the age of 5 months irrespective of cause of death be obtained by a veterinarian. We will be posting proper collection and pertinent facts for preserving the specimen on the website Wedge biopsies should be sent to Dr. Cathy Brown at University of Georgia, Athens.

During 2008, the Canine Health Foundation Donor-Assisted Account received total contributions of \$1064.88 which emanated from Purina Parent Club Partnership (\$989.88) and other sources (\$75.00) resulting in a balance of \$152,299.65. During the year, the AMSC sponsored Canine Chronic Valvular Degenerative Disease (\$1500.00), Variations in Thyroid Hormone and the Estrus Cycle (\$1000.00), Genotyping for Liver Shunts/Microvascular Dvsplasia (\$10,000.00), and Histocompatibility Alleles for Diabetes, Thyroiditis & IMHA (\$1780.00). The balance as we begin 2009 is \$117,185.43. In the summary document we received there was an undescribed loss of \$25,000.00 which we can only presume is related to funding portfolio losses. However, since this is the first summary statement we have ever received, we will be making inquiries re the stated loss.

For the Grant #0963, Genotyping Small Breed Dogs with Porto-systemic Vascular Anomalies and Microvascular Dysplasia (Dr. Sharon Center, Principal Investigator), we did receive an updated progress report. So far, sample collection, pedigree development and sample preparation, serum bile acid measurements and DNA have been obtained on over 1000 dogs in several breeds including miniature schnauzers. Work is progressing as expected. (Health Committee note: Our breed is involved in this study through the efforts of a breeder who wishes to remain anonymous. It is clear from the confidential scientific report that miniature schnauzers are an integral part of this work. The Health Committee wishes to acknowledge these efforts to the Board and extend a Thank You to the Breeder for being courageous enough to become involved for the betterment of our breed.)

As always we wish to thank the AMSC Board for their continued support and for sharing our vision for the CHIC program. We hope 2009 will bring with it new and exciting developments in the treatment and prevention of diseases affected all breeds of dog, but especially our beloved Miniature Schnauzers.

#### MANAGING ARTHRITIS

Newsletter of the Community Practice Service Spring 06 College of Veterinary Medicine, Washington State University

Chronic osteoarthritis or OA is an affliction for many people and pets, especially as they age. This condition in pets usually results from an underlying disease process. The most common are joint instability or loss of normal joint contact surfaces due to elbow or hip dysplasia. Injuries can also produce OA.

It is estimated that 20 percent of dogs in the United States may be affected by OA. As with humans, not all animals with OA require treatment. For those that do, there are several measures owners can take to make their pets more comfortable and decrease the severity of clinical signs.

"Usually your veterinarian can tell you if your pet is predisposed to arthritis, such as with joint conformation problems, breed history, and so on," said Dr. Raelynn Farnsworth of the WSU Community Practice. "Weight management, nutritional supplements, and non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs or NSAIDs like Rimadyl™ or Deramaxx™ are some of the most effective ways to help pets with this problem."

Although helpful in relieving discomfort for pets with osteoarthritis, adverse reactions such as gastrointestinal upset can be seen with all canine-approved NSAIDs, and are advised to be used "only as needed." Currently, there are no FDA-approved NSAIDs for cats, although a veterinarian may prescribe a canine-approved NSAID for a very short time for feline pets when indicated.

Weight loss relieves continual undue stress on an animal's joints. "Weight loss/control singly has been shown to have a profound effect on the comfort level of a dog with OA," said Dr. Steve Martinez, a WSU veterinary orthopedic surgeon. "Exercise modification, not restriction, is also very important. Avoiding prolonged high impact activities such as free running, Frisbee catching, long distance jogging, etc., and replacing them with low-impact activities such as swimming, walking on grassy flat areas, etc., are also much less stressful on osteoarthritic joints."

Dietary supplements such as glucosamine and chondroitin sulfate may also help with joint health. Glucosamine provides the building blocks to form new cartilage and joint fluid, which makes joints more slippery and healthy. Chondroitin sulfate reduces degenerative enzymes that break down cartilage in a joint, and it also helps lubricate joints. "Research has shown that glucosamine and certain chondroitin sulfates can have a profound anti-in-

flammatory effect if used together," Dr. Martinez said. "This effect may decrease the likelihood that an animal with an acute flare-up of chronic OA will require NSAIDs treatment, or may require only a short course of NSAID treatment."

"There are many different forms and sources of glucosamine and chondroitin because they are absorbed differently by animals," Dr. Farnsworth said. "Owners should consult their veterinarian about putting their pet on a diet or giving them supplements or medications to help with osteoarthritis. They can also call WSU's veterinary teaching hospital and receive advice." To date, other nutritional supplements, such as MSM and SAMe, believed to have beneficial effects for OA patients, have not been clinically tested and do not impact the clinical signs of OA in pets.

Pet owners also need to realize that human drugs and NSAID formulations can be potentially fatal to a pet. "Studies have shown there is a fine line between the therapeutic and toxic ranges for certain medications for small animals," Dr. Farnsworth said. "Even one Tylenol pill can be extremely toxic to a cat, or ibuprofen (e.g. Advil) for a dog. A human-size dose of some medications can cause gastrointestinal upset, liver and kidney disease, and potentially death in pets. For this reason, pets should only receive pet-formulated NSAIDs prescribed by a veterinarian and not use medications formulated for human consumption unless under direct supervision by a veterinarian."

Veterinarians can also prescribe supplements in pill form, or specialized diets formulated with glucosamine and chondroitin, as well as Omega-3 and Omega-6 fatty acids to help with joint health.

For many animals that need to lose weight, the extra pounds should come off slowly. A veterinarian can formulate a weight loss plan suitable for an individual pet, and may include food reductions, a specialized diet, and exercise.

The Small Animal Orthopedic Service at WSU specializes in helping small animals with bone- and joint-related problems, including OA. This service provides expertise and abilities to treat certain forms of OA with surgery, including arthroscopy, and medical management including physical therapy.




