Blind dogs can see after new ISU treatment for a sudden onset blinding disease

AMES, Iowa — If two dogs are any indication, Iowa State University veterinary researchers may have found a cure for a previously incurable disease that causes dogs to go blind suddenly.

Dr. Sinisa Grozdanic with the optical coherence tomography scan that is needed to confirm the condition of a dog's retina before the dog can be considered for the experimental SARDS treatment. Iowa State is the only veterinary institution using this advanced diagnostic technology.

In the past six weeks, two dogs have been successfully treated for sudden acquired retinal degeneration syndrome (SARDS) by a research team led by ISU veterinary ophthalmologist Dr. Sinisa Grozdanic in the College of Veterinary Medicine.

The experimental treatment is the first to reverse blindness and restore sight to dogs diagnosed with SARDS. The treatment restored sight to the two dogs that were treated on April 12 and April 27.

"This is the first small sign of hope that actually something can be done," Grozdanic said.

The dogs were treated with intravenous immunoglobulin (IVIg), a human blood product that contains antibodies from the plasma of thousands of blood donors. It is used to treat immune deficiencies, inflammatory diseases and autoimmune diseases

"Although the dogs won't be catching any Frisbees, they can navigate and not bump into objects," Grozdanic said.

SARDS was first identified in the 1980s and blinds as many as 4,000 dogs each year in North America, he said. The dogs have a sudden loss of vision despite no structural changes to the eyes or damage to the retinas in the early stages of the disease. Their eyes appear completely normal, but their retinas show no electrical activity. Grozdanic and his colleagues wanted a better understanding of the molecular mechanisms that cause SARDS. They worked with the University of Iowa's Department of Ophthalmology and Vision Sciences to conduct genetic testing of SARDS tissue, cross referencing the results with the U of I's datebase of genetic information from different human ocular diseases.

"We saw that the molecular profile of SARDS eyes is very similar to immune mediated retinopathy in humans, which is usually antibody induced. That was the key factor," Grozdanic said.

Immune-mediated retinopathy in humans was not treatable until about 10 years ago when IVIg was found to show results in some patients.

Although the treatment has worked in two SARDS dogs, not every dog is a good candidate, Grozdanic cautions. Dogs with severe cardiac or kidney disease cannot tolerate IVIg. And it won't work in a dog whose retina degeneration is advanced. "Once a dog gets SARDS, the retina degenerates quickly, so it's important the dog is treated with IVIg very soon after diagnosis," he said. "Usually dogs that have SARDS for longer than two months have severe retinal changes. The sooner it's treated, the better chance it will work." An optical coherence tomography scan is needed to confirm the condition of a dog's retina. Iowa State University's Veterinary Medicine Hospital is the only veterinary institution using this advanced diagnostic technology, which is more commonly found in large ophthalmology centers for humans. Diagnostic tests cost about \$700. If the dog is a good candidate for treatment, hospitalization and intensive care fees will be about \$1,200. The IVIg cost will be between \$35-40 per pound of the dog's body weight. "At this point, the biggest unknown is how long the treatment will last. It could be anywhere from a few weeks to a few years," Grozdanic said.

Grozdanic recommends owners visit the nearest veterinary ophthalmologist as soon as a dog exhibits any loss in vision.

Submission Criteria

- . All submissions must be signed by all registered owners of the dog.
- 2. All submissions of affected dogs must include a diagnostic report or necropsy report specifying a diagnosis of avian tuberculosis or mycobacterium avium, except as outlined in item 3.
- 3. Submissions for disseminated mycobacteriosis without an identified species will be accepted, but not published unless documentation is provided as outlined in item 2, to validate a full sibling was affected with avian tuberculosis.
- 4. All submission of producing dogs (dogs that have produced an affected offspring) must include a diagnostic report or necropsy report specifying a diagnosis as outlined in item 2, and either a copy of the affected offspring registration certificate or a copy of the offspring certified pedigree to verify parentage.
- 5. For submission for producing dogs, the affected offspring will not be identified in the database based on the submission of the sire or dam. An affected dog must be submitted as outlined in items 1-3.
- 6. All submissions must include a copy of the submitted dog's registration certificate.
- 7. The Health Committee may notify the breeder of the dog's status, if deemed appropriate.

AMSC Voluntary Open Database for Avian Tuberculosis Submission Form, cont'd from p. 2

Mandated notes to accompany submission form for AMSC Voluntary Open Registry for Avian Tuberculosis Approved by the AMSC Board of Directors April 2004

Mycobacterium avium is the scientific name used for avian tuberculosis. It is named Avian Tuberculosis because the normal host organism is birds (Aves). For the purposes of this notice the term MAC will be used (mycobacterium avium complex). MAC infection is common in birds, but infections in mammals are rare. According to Dr. Craig Green's book Infectious Diseases of the Dog and Cat, MAC infections in dogs and cats have rarely been reported. One published research study involving experimental exposure of dogs to MAC by various means concluded that dogs possess a natural resistance to infection with MAC.

A disproportionate number of Miniature Schnauzers have been definitively diagnosed with disseminated MAC infection. There have also been a number of Miniature Schnauzers diagnosed with mycobacteriosis where the species was not identified, and a number of possible cases with diagnoses ranging from lymphosarcoma to histiocytosis, no biopsies were performed and the dogs were euthanized. Those diagnosed with mycobacteriosis could logically be MAC, but this cannot be presumed, unless these dogs have also had a full sibling affected and diagnosed with MAC. Cases of MAC have been reported largely in the U.S. and Canada, with some reports in other countries such as Poland, Australia, and Europe. Incidentally, there have been two reported cases of systemic Aspergillosis, a fungal infection from another opportunistic pathogen. Both dogs have pedigree associations to dogs that have produced MAC affected offspring. It is possible that this defect could predispose certain dogs to other types of opportunistic diseases.

Based on statistical analysis of the genetic pedigree and results of very limited test-breeding this immune system defect appears to be inherited as an autosomal recessive disorder. Although it appears to possibly be simple autosomal recessive, a polygenic recessive mode of inheritance cannot be ruled out. An X-linked mode of inheritance has been ruled out due to the almost equal representation of both sexes. A dominant mode of inheritance is possible, but unlikely, as the vast majority of parents of affected dogs were not themselves affected. It must be stated that at this time there is no

conclusive scientific proof that a Miniature Schnauzer's susceptibility to this infection is genetically based. This theory is based purely on the following evidence:

- 1. Available veterinary literature pertaining to this topic indicates dogs in general are considered to be innately resistant to MAC infection. Dogs are potentially exposed to this pathogen in the environment without becoming infected.
- Available veterinary literature outlining research into experimental exposure of dogs to MAC indicates dogs that were experimentally exposed to MAC via ingestion did not develop disseminated or even localized infection.
- 3. MAC organisms, especially M. avium, are in the environment, in soils and water, carcasses, and in bird feces, and can remain viable in the environment for at least 2 years. In spite of this seemingly unavoidable exposure risk, reported cases in Miniature Schnauzers are limited to dogs of particular lineage.
- 4. There are at least 5 litters from which 2 or more siblings have become infected with disseminated disease. Many of these siblings lived in separate homes.
- 5. There are at least 5 stud dogs that have produced 2 or more affected offspring when bred to 2 or more different dams.
- 6. All cases demonstrate relatedness to a particular bitch, either through one of her daughters or one of her sons, who himself produced affected offspring.
- 7. Test-breeding of the son of an affected back to his dam (who was the full sister of the affected dog) yielded 1 male and 1 female offspring. The female became naturally infected (not experimentally infected) and died from disseminated MAC infection at about 1.5 years of age, the male is still apparently healthy. These 2 dogs were housed together and exposed to the same environments for their entire lives. Neither parent has become infected with MAC.

There may be some confusion over genetics and susceptibility. This is not a genetic infection. An infection is caused by bacteria, virus, or fungus. The susceptibility to certain infections may be genetic. If this is the case it would indicate a genetically based immune system defect that renders the individual's immune system incapable of mounting an appropriate immune response to the pathogen. The complexity of the immune system means the defective portion responsible for combating certain pathogens may not be responsible for immune responses to other infections. For example, one part of the system may be responsible for phagocytic action, where the cells basically digest the bacteria, another part of the immune system is responsible for antibody production, and a third part response to

viral, fungal, and protozoal infections, and intracellular bacteria. Often the components of these system overlap, but some also have specific jobs.

MAC is considered potentially zoonotic, meaning it can be transmitted to others. To date no recorded cases of a human contracting this infection from an infected dog have been reported. Immune-competent individuals are most likely not at risk as humans generally have the same innate immunity. Due to the lack of a DNA test, the potential for zoonosis, and the continuing rise in the number of cases of affected Miniature Schnauzers, the AMSC has approved this voluntary open registry for use by breeders as a tool for managing this defect in the breed population. It has been approved to assist breeders in educating themselves about this defect and to facilitate pedigree research to enable breeders to make educated breeding decisions. The primary goal of this registry to assist breeders so the carrier and affected rates of this defect can be controlled until a DNA test is developed.

Unfortunately, misuse of such a database can result in the unnecessary and potentially damaging removal of a number of dogs from the breed population. Mass removal of dogs from particular lines can further limit the gene pool. cause a loss of the valuable genes from these lines, and disable research activities designed to solve the problem, Geneticists state it is impossible to eradicate a recessive gene from the population without an accurate DNA test. This is evidenced by the recent cases of CJC reported in our breed. Our goal is not to eliminate every possible carrier from the population. The tools provided can help breeders select to minimize the risk of producing dogs that will become affected while retaining the qualities they value in their dogs and those dogs' ancestors. The premise of removing or cleansing the population of dogs that may be carriers for defects is not realistic, since most dogs possess some type of defect in their genetic makeup. This is clearly illustrated in the fact that many prolific and influential sires in our breed have ultimately produced some type of defect.

This database is designed to be published in AMSCope and depends solely on voluntary submission by owners of affected and producing dogs. Criteria for submission appear on the reverse of the submission form. The AMSC Health Committee will strictly adhere to these criteria. The published list will enable breeders to access the names of submitted dogs. This will enable breeders to research pedigrees, and provide assistance by enabling breeders to evaluate the risks behind their own dogs as well as the risk of producing an affected dog from a planned breeding.


