From the Board Policy set June 17, 1983, "Voting Procedure at Board Meetings" –

"For the purposes of the rules governing voting at the Board of Governors meetings, the phrase "of those voting" means <u>all</u> of those present and eligible to vote. Failure of an eligible member to vote shall be recorded as an abstention. Taken together, positive votes, negative votes and abstentions shall comprise the total vote cast. The effect of an abstention under these rules is negative when calculating an affirmative majority."

Clarification: All present and eligible to vote are counted in the total vote. At AMSC Board Meetings the chair, if eligible, is <u>required</u> to cast a vote.

From Article VI of the Constitution & By-Laws, Section 3, section (b) The quorum for any meeting of the Board shall be a majority of the Board.

From Article VII of the Constitution & By-Laws, Section 3, AII business voted by the Board shall be passed by a two-thirds affirmative vote of those voting, with the exception of the selection of the Nominating Committee and the selection of a member to fill a Board vacancy, which shall be by a majority vote.

The judge for the regular classes is Mrs. Marcia Feld with an entry of 57. The new sweeps judge is Ms. Gloria Kerr from Arizona who has an entry of 15 in Sweepstakes and 6 in Veteran Sweepstakes. She has stewarded our breed at Montgomery and gone to several judge's seminars.

The Board Meeting was held on Friday, June 20, 2014 at 6:30 PM in the Regent room on the Queen Mary. No food will be served.

- Zingler of the MCKC that their organization supply 2 ring stewards, at no charge, for Miniature Schnauzer breed judging at the 2014 AMSC National Specialty MCKC show.

-Constitution & By-Laws: Beth Santure No report.

-Montgomery County Dinner & Annual Meeting: Brooke Walker

The spacious studios at the Homewood Suites are \$129. Having heavy hors d'oeuvres and not a sit down dinner is the plan. There are 50 rooms reserved at the hotel. There will be a "garage sale" at the meeting also. The food that will be available will not be knife and fork type foods. There will be a response required for a head count for the gathering to determine the approximate number of attendees at least 1 week prior to the show. Brooke was able to negotiate the cost for the room rental down to \$100 from \$400 at the host hotel. The contract is in place for the host hotel. The capacity of the room will be checked for meeting capability after the hors d'oeuvres. Motion was made by Carole Weinberger to charge \$15 per head with the remaining costs covered by the AMSC. It was seconded by Kathy Colby and passed unanimously.

-DVD Sales: Vicki Kubic

No report. We should eliminate this committee for next year as we are moving to the new company that will be handling all the transactions in the future. Committee will be called upon as needed in the future.

-Education: Wyoma Clouss

As reported at the last meeting, we presented AMSC's Judges Ed as part of the Scottsdale AZ judges programs. We also coached judges on using the wicket. AKC is emphasizing correct measuring procedure - every judge applying for a size or weight restricted breed is tested each they So AKC has supplied us with materials on measuring that need to be added to our PowerPoint and to our packet of materials. At this point, I am not aware of any other presentations planned for 2014. An educational seminar on using a wicket for measuring was completed at GWTA by Lee Herr with the AKC on Saturday, June 21.

are getting rid of a lot of the verbiage from the old website edited down.

-Ethics: Carole Weinberger, Marcia Feld, Patti Henderson

The committee supports the idea of an annual submittal of the Breeder Referral application to have breeders reconfirm their participation on the breeder list. Several Board members expressed concerns over removing the wording involving the mandatory spaying/neutering of companion dogs from the Code of Ethics. Because the AMSC is an AKC approved club, the AMSC Code of Ethics must be in compliance with AKC rules.

BREEDER REFERRAL DOCUMENTATION

The members of the Ethics Committee met via teleconference on May 18, 2004. Carole Weinberger, Patti Henderson, and Marcia Feld were present. We discussed the wording of the proposed agreement for the Breeder Referral List and agreed unanimously that the Yorkshire Terrier Club's Preface was adequate to relieve the AMSC of any legal responsibility for puppies obtained from AMSC members on the list. Further, we feel that the members can be asked to sign the Code of Ethics as a condition of inclusion on the Referral List. Any problems reported to the AMSC about puppy purchases from members can then be investigated as a violation of the Code of Ethics and appropriate actions taken.

We did, however, upon an examination of the Code of Ethics, find several items that we felt were no longer pertinent, and should be addressed and either eliminated or changed by the Board. The Veterinary Community is finding that early spaying and neutering is not in the best interest of the dog. We are therefore suggesting references to that practice be eliminated or changed in provisions 3 and later 2 of the part referencing registration and sales or Transfer of Ownership. Specifically:

Provision 3. Sell any puppy or adult having a known hereditary health defect or unsound temperament only with a Limited Registration and Spay/Neuter Contract.

Provision 2. On a Spay/Neuter Contract, whereby, the breeder may withhold AKC registration papers until receipt of proof that

the puppy has been altered.

We felt that these items should be discussed and agreed on between the parties involved and not be a part of the Code of Ethics. Furthermore, the AKC will not support a breeder withholding papers and suggests that we use the Limited Registration form for this.

Discussion at the Board came to the following actions for the REGISTRATION AND SALES OR TRANSFER OF OWNERSHIP section of the CODE OF ETHICS:

CURRENT LANGUAGE IN CODE OF ETHICS UNDER DISCUSSION AND MOTIONS MADE ON:

"REGISTRATION AND SALES OR TRANSFER OF OWNERSHIP

Members of the American Miniature Schnauzer Club will:

Sell each puppy or adult with a written health guarantee, a three-generation pedigree, a record of immunizations, care and feeding instructions, and registration papers where applicable.

- Inform the buyer of the characteristics of Miniature Schnauzers, and make available to the novice the benefit of his advice and experience.
- Sell any puppy or adult having a known hereditary health defect or unsound temperament only with a Limited Registration and Spay/ Neuter Contract.

If a puppy is sold as a companion animal, it may be sold one of two ways:

- 1. On a Limited Registration.
- 2. On a Spay/Neuter Contract whereby the breeder may withhold AKC registration papers until receipt of proof that the puppy has been altered."

Motion 1 by Carole Weinberger and seconded by Kathy Colby – Change the language from "If a puppy is sold as a comanion animal, it may be sold one of two ways:

1. On a Limited Registration.

 On a Spay/Neuter Contract whereby the breeder may withhold AKC registration papers until receipt of proof that the puppy has been altered between the breeder and the buyer."

Vote was 10 ayes, 1 no, 1 abstention, Motion passed by majority vote.

Motion 2 by Vicki Kubic and seconded by Carole Weinberger – Remove language from "Members of the American Miniature Schnauzer Club will: 3. Sell any puppy or adult having a known hereditary health defect or unsound temperament only with a Limited Registration and Spay/Neuter Contract." Motion was passed unanimously.

Motion 3 by Carma Ewer and seconded by Vicki Kubic – Add clarifying language to "Members of the American Miniature Schnauzer Club will: 3. Sell any **companion** puppy or **companion** adult having a known hereditary health defect or unsound temperament only with a Limited Registration and Spay/Neuter Contract."

APPLICATION FOR REFERRAL LISTING IN AMSC WEBPAGE

"As an AMSC Member, you are expected to abide by our AMSC Code of Ethics when dealing with each other and with the public. and you are expected to provide factual information about Miniature Schnauzers. Any Miniature Schnauzer placed or sold is expected to be clean, free of parasites, healthy, well socialized, and honestly represented which includes any relevant health risk. You are expected to be honest and competent in services such as grooming or training that you provide. Any complaints against you or the services that you provide related to this Referral listing will be investigated by the Ethics Committee, and negative findings may result in your listing being revoked."

This language would be followed by the revised Code of Ethics and the following sign off language:

"I agree to the foregoing. Signed......."

Breeder Referral application will be required to be renewed annually. All AMSC members will be asked reconfirm their support of the revised Code of Ethics. Those who do not acknowledge the application and return it completed may be removed from the club and will be removed from the breeder referral listing. All submittals will

be sent to the Ethics Committee. The logistics of the reconfirmation of non breeder members and the annual application for breeders will be worked out in the future.

Renal Disease in Adult Miniature Schnauzers

Miniature Schnauzers are one of several breeds of dogs with a juvenile-onset renal disease that is thought to have an inherited basis. Using funds provided by the American Miniature Schnauzer Club, renal tissues from Miniature Schnauzers with renal disease were identified. Using light and electron microscopy, this proteinuric renal disease has been identified as focal segmental glomerulosclerosis (FSGS). In the early stages of this disease, dogs with FSGS have protein in their urine but are otherwise asymptomatic. An award from the Gray Lady Foundation is being used by the Athens Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory to conduct urine testing free of charge in Miniature Schnauzers in order to identify animals with FSGS. The goals of this study are to determine prevalence of proteinuria in this breed and to identify affected animals that could benefit from early treatment to slow its progression.

Submission of urine samples for Urine Protein to Creatinine ratio (+/- urinalysis)

A urine protein to creatinine ratio (UPC) will be determined on each urine sample. If the UPC is elevated, a urinalysis (microscopic examination) will also be done to rule-out a urinary tract infection, inflammation, or hemorrhage as a cause of the proteinuria.

- 1. Voided free catch urine is adequate for this testing. Alternatively, urine may be collected via cystocentesis or catheterization.
- 2. Collect urine into a 10 ml clot (red top no SST) tube. You may also use plastic cups with screw-on lids or plastic conical tubes (clean, but do not need to be sterile). If collected by cystocentesis, the urine may be submitted in the syringe **with the needle removed** and the end sealed.
- 3. A minimum volume of 3 ml is preferred; smaller volumes may suffice if a urinalysis is not required.
- 4. After collection, refrigerate the sample and send, with a cold pack, overnight UPS or Fed Ex to the Athens Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory. Please include the attached submission form.

-Makeup of AMSC Board discussion

Eight of our 22 Board members will not have attended either of our face to face meetings. Their only option for attendance would be if we decide to have a regular face to face Board meeting at Montgomery instead of a phone conference in September, and if those eight would attend.

With 2 Face to Face (AZ, GW) and 2 phone calls (Nov & Apr) —

We have eight Board members who will have attended 2 Face to Face, 2 phone calls; four who will have attended 2 Face to Face, 1 phone call; two who will have attended 1 Face, 2 phone; five who will have attended 0 Face, 2 phone; one who will have attended 0 Face, 1.33 phone; two who have will have attended 0 Face to Face, 1 phone. According to the schedule we approved, there are two more phone calls on August 13, 2014, Wednesday and September 17, 2014, Wednesday prior to Montgomery County. At least on the surface, it appears that participating as a Board member may be too difficult for some. It appears we need to at least consider options. This would keep our knowledge base active and involved. Some advisory committees can be built as needed. There will need to be a rewrite of our by-laws. Current Board members do not have to guit and may opt to move to the Advisory Committee. Are Heartworms Developing Resistance to Preventatives?

More dogs on year-round preventative are testing positive for heartworms

In August 2010, representatives of the American Heartworm Society (AHS), the Companion Animal Parasite Council (CAPC), and experts in the field of nematode resistance met in Atlanta. Their goal was to discuss the possibility of heartworms becoming resistant to "macrocyclic lactones," the scientific name for the heartworm preventatives we know as Heartgard (ivermectin), Interceptor (milbemycin oxime), Revolution (selamectin), and ProHeart (moxidectin).

Dr. Everett Mobley, a veterinarian who practices in Missouri, wrote about this issue in his "Your Pet's Best Friend" blog in May 2009. He says that he first began noticing an increase in the number of dogs in his clinic who tested positive for heartworms despite being on year-round heartworm preventatives in 2006. He learned that other veterinarians were reporting similar experiences, and that "These reports come from the Mississippi valley, starting about 100 miles south of St. Louis, and getting worse as one goes south."

Experts dismissed these reports for a long time as being due to "client noncompliance," that is, owners failing to give the preventatives to their dogs 12 months a year. It was not until April 2009 that they began to say, "We know that something has changed, but we don't know what it is. There is a problem, but the underlying cause has not been determined."

The issue was a primary topic of discussion at the American Heartworm Society's 2010 Triennial Symposium held in April. A landmark initial study was presented that evaluated heartworm microfilariae in different regions of the Mississippi Delta. The study revealed differences in sensitivity of the samples to macrycyclic lactones. Separate experiments revealed genetic variability of heartworms in different geographic locations, which could potentially be associated with varying responses to the drugs.

Recommendations

The AHS and CAPC issued a statement in November regarding the findings of the meeting in Atlanta, acknowledging the

problem and calling for further study. They believe that any heartworm resistance is geographically limited (presumably to the Mississippi valley) at this time based on credible reports of lack of efficacy. They recommend that pet owners continue to give preventatives year-round, following label directions, as they continue to be effective for the vast majority of dogs. There is no evidence that higher doses or more frequent dosing would increase protection. They also recommend yearly heartworm testing for all dogs, even if they have been kept on preventatives.

In the past, we have recommended that people might safely extend the time between doses of heartworm preventatives

to six weeks, and decrease the dosage when using Interceptor, based on the efficacy studies that were done when the FDA approved these drugs. It is safer to administer preventatives monthly and to give the full label dosage. Following these steps will also ensure that, should your dog become infected, the product manufacturer's guarantee will be honored and treatment costs will be covered. (Manufacturers will guarantee a product only when purchased from a vet.)

We still question the need to give preventatives year-round in cold climates, where mosquitoes cannot survive during the winter. The heartworm life cycle requires the larvae to spend time inside a mosquito in order to develop into adults; without mosquitoes, there is no risk of infection. In warm climates such as the southern halfofthe U.S. (below the 37th parallel), give heartworm preventatives year-round. This is also necessary to avoid voiding the manufacturers' quarantees.

If you choose not to give heartworm preventatives year-round, keep in mind that these drugs work "backward," killing larvae that may have infected your dog in the *previous* month. Give the last dose after temperatures have dropped, and start them up again a month after your area warms up. If temperatures remain above about 45 to 50 degrees, day and night, you should give your dog monthly heartworm preventatives.

Benadryl for Dogs: What You Need to Know

If your dog is has itchy skin or cold or flulike symptoms, your vet might prescribe a human medication, Benadryl, for use with your dog.

As part of a Paw Nation series providing background about the medical problems your pet may suffer from, we spoke to Dr. Jean Hofve, holistic veterinarian and author living in Denver, Colorado, to get some insights about the use of the drug.

Of course, you should always consult your veterinarian before giving medicine or supplements to your pet.

What is Benadryl for dogs? Benadryl is a brand name, but the drug's name is diphenhydramine.

Can you buy it over-the-counter? Benadryl for dogs is available over-thecounter under many generic labels. However, it is not FDA-approved for veterinary use.

What is the most common use of Benadryl for dogs?

It's mainly used as an antihistamine for allergic skin disease. It is also used to treat motion sickness and, on occasion, to prevent anaphylaxis. For example, when an animal has had a bad reaction to a vaccine, Benadryl may be administered prior to the next vaccine.

What are the main benefits of Benadryl for dogs?

Antihistamines such as diphenhydramine may be somewhat helpful for dogs who are itchy due to inhalant allergies. They are usually used together with other drugs, because antihistamines are not reliably effective alone.

What are common risks?

Drowsiness is the main side effect. Since dogs don't drive or operate heavy machinery, it is relatively safe for them.

Are there long-term concerns with Benadryl for dogs?

Long-term potential adverse effects have not been well studied. Many allergies in dogs are seasonal, so the drug isn't usually used for more than a few months at a time. The maker (McNeil PPC) cautions that Benadryl may cause cardiac symptoms. In older adult humans, long-term use may lead to cognitive dysfunction — a condition that also affects older dogs. It is also dehydrating, which may be an issue for animals with bladder or kidney disease.

How expensive is Benadryl for dogs and are there alternatives?

It is the same as any generic diphenhydramine. There are alternative antihistamines including

chlorpheniramine, cyproheptadine, and hydroxyzine. Most of these require a prescription.

Vacation: Where Will You Leave Your Dog?

If you're planning to go on vacation, you may be wondering what to do with your four-legged friend. He would rather be with you, of course, but that's not always possible. There are times when you must leave him behind.

Boarding your dog

Boarding your dog at a kennel is a good choice if your dog is friendly and sociable. Dogs can readily adapt to staying at a kennel, especially if they were introduced to it at a young age. It's a good idea, though, to leave him for short periods, such as weekends, before leaving him for a longer trip.

Finding a good kennel

Ask your vet and other dog owners for recommendations. Remember that other people may have different standards than you: For some people, location and price are the most important factors. Your vet or your breeder may have facilities for boarding dogs, and if so, these may be excellent options because they know your dog. It's worthwhile to ask around.

Once you have a list of kennels, visit each one and ask to inspect the facilities. Make sure accommodations are clean, dry, and hygienic—and that kennels, cages, and gates are in good repair. Ask to see where your dog will stay. Ideally, he should be provided with his own comfortable run. If the kennel operators are genuinely interested in making sure your dog is comfortable, they will be happy to provide you with a tour and answer any questions that you have.

Keep in mind when testing for heartworms that it takes at least six months following exposure before a dog will test positive. This interval may be increased if the dog is being treated with heartworm preventatives during this time. The AHS now recommends that three consecutive negative tests, each six months apart, may be needed before we can feel confident that a dog is not infected with heartworms. Research into possible resistance of heartworms to current medications is ongoing in a number of universities and other centers in the United States, Canada, and Italy. We'll keep you updated.*

Fetching your Dog's Passion

Regardless of age or breed, all dogs have an activity they enjoy to the exclusion of all others. The goal as a responsible dog owner is to find that activity and allow our dogs the chance to participate in that activity regularly. Before you embark on the long and occasionally twisted path of dog activities there are some requirements that should be met.

Remember the mantra "A tired puppy is a good puppy." The saying applies to adult dogs as well. This is often the most underutilized tool for dog owners. Regular and age appropriate exercise is far more beneficial than most owners realize. The routine walks for "elimination", while beneficial, do not meet the exercise requirements of most dogs. Simply charging down the sidewalk while pulling at the end of the leash usually results in a frustrated dog and owner. Games and activities that encourage your dog to think and solve problems as well as physical activity produce much calmer and more relaxed dogs.

The next element in this journey is socialization and basic obedience. Before you can expect to participate in an activity that involves other dogs, animals, equipment and people it is very important to safely expose your dog to new situations. In addition to learning basic commands, puppy kindergarten and beginner obedience classes are wonderful places for socializing your dog in a safe supervised situation. These classes are very helpful because the trainer will be able to observe and help with any behavior/training issues you may be experiencing either in class or at home.

Once you have begun socializing and basic obedience training with your dog, you can investigate local clubs and training facilities to see what activities are available. Below are some of the activities you could expect to find:

Obedience/Rally:

Designed to create dogs who can focus on their handler and perform the required task when asked. Many dogs find that the rewards of obedience exercises are so stimulating they will rapidly run through the exercise and wag for more.

Agility: Designed for higher energy dogs who can learn to take direction from a distance often love the challenge of

agility. Giving the dog physical obstacles and mental challenges can often give an unfocused dog just the outlet they need to gain confidence and build a strong bond with their handler.

Lure Coursing: Designed for sight hounds such as greyhounds, whippets or salukis that chase a visual target.

Tracking: Designed for dogs that follow a scent trail. Many Sporting breeds excel at tracking.

Herding: Designed for dogs bred to aide shepherds with their flocks or herds. Some dogs prefer herding-moving the flock from place to place for the shepherd. Other dogs prefer Tending-keeping the herd within certain boundaries while they graze.

Pet Therapy: Designed for dogs who crave the companionship of people, love attention and are calm enough to greet new people in new situations. The team (handler and dog) need to have completed the AKC's Canine Good Citizen® evaluation, a pet therapy program and ultimately are certified as a Pet Therapy Team. Pet therapy is one of the most rewarding and demanding activities for both the owner and the dog. Sharing the joy your dog brings to you with others truly intensifies the bond between you.

Many facilities offer Obedience, Rally, Agility, AKC's Canine Good Citizen® program, Flyball and Pet Therapy to name a few. When deciding which activity to pursue, consider what your dog was bred to do. It is also important to find the activity your dog enjoys and a trainer that you both connect with. Some dogs are confident outgoing and easy to work, others may be shy or soft and shut down if too much pressure is used, and other dogs are strong and stubborn. Working with a trainer that can adapt their style to your dog will make the journey a joy.











AMSC Breeder Referral Application

The AMSC Board has been discussing the process for updating the Breeder Referral system for the new webpage. There will be a map, that when clicked, will list names for that area. The referral page will have a "due diligence" clause and a link to our AMSC Code of Ethics. New verbiage follows:

The American Miniature Schnauzer Club has a listing of members who have agreed to and signed the AMSC's Code of Ethics. This listing should be used for reference only and due diligence is your responsibility. Note: the AMSC does not guarantee the health or services provided by any member and does not assume any liability regarding agreements provided by the consumer and the AMSC members listed within. Buyers should use utmost care before making a decision to purchase a dog. This listing does not bind the AMSC nor does it quarantee or accept any liability or responsibility for the quality, health, or temperament of any dog. NO warranty is to be assumed or implied by this publication by inclusion or omission as it pertains fitness of merchandise or integrity, by any AMSC member on this list.

Code of Ethics and Code of Conduct -

Members of the American Miniature Schnauzer Club strive to:

- 1. Comply with the Rules and Regulations of the American Kennel Club (AKC), the Constitution and By-laws of the American Miniature Schnauzer Club (AMSC) and the Code of Ethics.
- 2. Conduct themselves in a manner that reflects positively on themselves, the breed, and the AMSC.
- 3. Exhibit good sportsmanship and good will at all dog-related events.
- 4. Make no false or misleading statements concerning the Miniature Schnauzer breed or other breeds or breeders.
- 5. Be responsible dog owners, treating their dogs humanely and providing them with adequate food, water, shelter, veterinary care, exercise, grooming and the

socialization and training necessary for them to be good family companions.

- 6. Make every effort to learn about the structure, anatomy, action, inherited traits and behavior of the dog, especially where such learning applies to the Miniature Schnauzer.
- 7. Use the official standard of the breed when evaluating and breeding their own stock, and encourage its application in judging.
- 8. Participate in efforts to assess and improve the health of the individual dog and of the Miniature Schnauzer breed, including, but not limited to, participation in valid, reliable and responsible testing for hereditary diseases, providing samples and information for development of hereditary disease tests, and sharing health information with other AMSC members. Be honest, factual and not misleading or fraudulent in any written or oral statement about dogs and breeding programs, whether about their own dogs or those of others.

BREEDING

Members of the American Miniature Schnauzer Club, as guardians of the breed, strive to breed conscientiously, taking responsibility for the lives they produce, including responsible placement of all puppies produced by any breeding, to ensure the safety and well-being of the individual dogs and of the breed.

- 1. Educate themselves to recognize the correct conformation of the Miniature Schnauzer, familiarizing themselves with the AKC breed standard and representative dogs, prior to breeding a stud dog or a brood bitch.
- 2. At all times breed for the improvement of the breed as exemplified by the AKC standard.
- 3. Breed only animals that are in good health and who are physically and temperamentally sound.
- 4. Strive to produce puppies of such quality that they will serve to improve and complement the breed and avoid breeding

individual Miniature Schnauzers known to have, or are strongly suspected of having, a serious inherited disease or defect that will likely be passed on to offspring and that, if inherited, would significantly affect the quality of life of any offspring that would be produced.

- 5. Represent each puppy sold as accurately as possible.
- Share information gained through breeding with other Miniature Schnauzer owners.
- 7. Act as a mentor to persons with whom they place puppies and encourage an open dialog for the life of the dog.

REGISTRATION AND SALES OR TRANSFER OF OWNERSHIP

- 1. Sell each puppy or adult with a written health guarantee, a three-generation pedigree, a record of immunizations, care and feeding instructions, and registration papers where applicable.
- 2. Inform the buyer of the characteristics of Miniature Schnauzers, and make available to the novice the benefit of his advice and experience.
- 3. Sell any companion puppy or companion adult having a known hereditary health defect only with a Limited Registration and Spay/Neuter Contract.

If a puppy is sold as a companion animal, it may be sold one of two ways:

- On a Limited Registration.
- 2. On a Spay/Neuter Contract between the breeder and the buyer.

The breeder shall remain responsible for the welfare of every dog he breeds, sells or places. This means making himself available to aid the new owner if and when the need presents itself. If in the future the owner is not able to keep the dog, the owner should be instructed to contact the seller and the seller will have the responsibility either to take the dog back or find it a new home.

The breeder will not sell or dispose of any dog through pet shops, wholesalers, commercial dealers or paid agents.

HERITABLE DISEASES/CONDITIONS

- 1. Make a determined effort to have all breeding animals tested for the presence of all heritable diseases or conditions known to afflict Miniature Schnauzers and not breed those discovered to be affected.
- 2. Send a report of the adverse test results to the AMSC Health Committee.

APPLICATION FOR REFERRAL LISTING IN AMSC WEBPAGE

As an AMSC Member, you are expected to abide by our AMSC Code of Ethics when dealing with each other and with the public, and you are expected to provide factual information about Miniature Schnauzers. Any Miniature Schnauzer placed or sold is expected to be clean, free of parasites, healthy, well socialized, and honestly represented which includes any relevant health risk. You are expected to be honest and competent in services such as grooming or training that you provide. Any complaints against you or the services that you provide related to this Referral listing will be investigated by the Ethics Committee, and negative findings may result in your listing being revoked.


Gateway Miniature Schnauzer Club in the International Cheese and Wine Canine Festival

Kennel questions you should ask:

- · How many dogs are there per assistant?
- How often are the dogs exercised, and for how long?
- Do the dogs get individual attention?
- · Will the kennel follow your feeding instructions?
- Can you leave your dog with a favorite toy, his bed, or an article of clothing with your scent?

Finally, do not board your dog at a kennel that does not require proof of up-to-date vaccinations. If they are not checking to make sure your dog is healthy and disease free, they are not checking other dogs, either. You could be putting your dog at risk.

Once you've made your choice, book your dog's stay well in advance of your trip. Kennels fill up during holidays and peak vacation periods. Get your dog in to see the vet for vaccinations and shots well in advance, too, because some may take two weeks to take effect.

Dog sitters

When you must leave your dog behind, another option is to arrange for a dog sitter. A dog sitter can be a friend, relative, neighbor, or a professional service. If you choose this option, consider whether you would prefer your dog to stay at home, or stay in the sitter's home. You know your dog best, so you are the best judge of where he will be most comfortable.

The advantages of keeping your dog at home are that he will remain in familiar surroundings, he will get to sleep in his own bed, and he will not be stressed by the presence of other dogs. The dog sitter can also bring in your mail and newspapers, water your plants, and watch over your home. The disadvantages are that your dog will be alone a lot of the time (especially if the sitter doesn't stay in your home) and if he gets out, or becomes ill, it may be a few hours

before the dog sitter arrives to notice.

If you arrange for a dog sitter, or hire a service, ask for references. You need to be sure that the person you engage is reliable, and that he or she will take the time to get to know your dog before your vacation. Ideally, they should become friends with your dog, and feed him and take him for a few walks before you leave.
