Prez Sez....

I hope this holiday season finds everyone well and in good spirits.

The Health Committee has reviewed a proposal from AKC Canine Health Foundation (CHF) and recommended that AMSC help fund research for Neuronal Ceroid Lipofuscinoses (NCL), a genetic disorder that causes degeneration of the nervous system. The Board has agreed with the Health Committee's recommendation and approved releasing \$8000 from our donor advised funds at CHF. We will be jointly funding this research with three other breeds and, of course, CHF. The total of the research is \$81,000 for a 2 year project. The really good thing about this is that the gene has been identified in 3 other breeds already and a test has been developed. The test is only \$40.

I know some orders for the Educational CD have been delayed. Please bear with us. All of the orders should have been mailed out by the time you get this AMSCope. We had some kinks in the order process, but they have all been resolved now. The Educational CD will be a great learning tool for all of us, especially newer folks and it will be an invaluable tool for aspiring judges of our breed. Any constructive feedback would be very much appreciated.

I would like to invite any of you that have an interest to help the club via committee work to please let me know. Tell me what committees interest you and/or what skills and interests that you have that could be a benefit to the AMSC. Also if you have suggestions that you think could help the club, please let me know. We are always looking at ways to improve things and to help serve our mission better. Any input would be greatly appreciated by me.

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First Aid for Dogs

Whether from a fall, burn, or traffic accident, dog emergencies can leave you and your dog feeling scared and helpless. But with a little knowledge and fast thinking, you can make a bad situation better. Remember, seconds count!

In all the situations below, call a veterinarian. Do not attempt the first aid described below if your dog is uncooperative as any struggle could cause further injury.

1. Fractures

- · Muzzle dog. (See below)
- Gently lay animal on a board, wooden door, tarp, etc. padded with blankets.
- Secure animal to the support. Do not attempt to set the fracture.
- If a limb is broken, wrap the leg in cotton padding, then wrap with a magazine, rolled newspaper, towel or support with two sticks. Splint should extend one joint above the fracture and one joint below. Secure with tape. Make sure wrap is not too tight and does not constrict blood flow. If the spine, ribs, hip, etc. appears injured or broken, gently place the animal on the stretcher and immobilize it if possible.

2. Bleeding (external)

- · Muzzle dog. (See below)
- Press thick gauze pad over wound. Apply firm direct pressure for about 5 to 7 minutes to stop the bleeding.
- If bleeding is severe and from a leg, apply a tourniquet above the wound.
- Loosen tourniquet for 20 seconds every 15-20 minutes.
- Note: a tourniquet is dangerous and should only be used in life-threatening hemorrhaging of a limb.

3. Bleeding (internal)

- Symptoms: bleeding from nose, mouth, rectum; coughing blood; blood in urine; pale gums; collapse; rapid or weak pulse; distended abdomen; difficulty breathing.
- Keep animal as warm and quiet as possible.
- · Seek veterinary attention as soon as

possible.

4. Burns

- · Chemical
- · Muzzle dog.
- Flush immediately with large quantities of cold water or apply ice.

5. Shock

- Symptoms: weak pulse; shallow breath ing; nervousness; dazed appearance.
- Often accompanies severe injury or extreme fright.
- · Keep animal restrained, quiet and warm.
- · If unconscious, keep head level with rest of body.

How to Restrain your Injured Dog

Unless your dog is unconscious, has difficulty breathing or a mouth injury, you must restrain him for the safety of all involved. Approach him with care, speaking reassuringly. Don't make any sudden movements and avoid eye contact. Restrain the dog first with a leash. To muzzle him, approach the dog from the side or behind his head, not from the front. Quickly slip the muzzle over the nose, secure snugly behind ears. If a muzzle is not available, you can make one from a strip of gauze, rag, necktie, belt or rope about 3 feet long.

- · Make a large loop in the center. Quickly slip loop over dog's nose.
- Bring ends under chin, cross ends, and tighten. Tie snugly behind ears.

Remember, any animal injured or in pain can bite or scratch you. Handle with care!

Make your Own First Aid Kit

Doggie first aid kits are available in pet stores. However, you can easily make one yourself. Here are some suggestions on what to include: Gauze pads, gauze roll/ bandages, roll of cloth, thermometer, tweezers, hydrogen peroxide, antibiotic ointment, Q-tips, instant cold pack, rags/ rubber tubing for tourniquet, First Aid book.

VALLEY FEVER

For Arizona pet owners and breeders, the diagnosis of "Valley Fever" is truly a heartbreaker. In a recent article in the Arizona Republic, it was reported that this year alone health officials expect 4,000 human cases of this disease. The numbers are climbing.

How many canine cases are there? Countless. This is based on feedback from the Arizona Humane Society and veterinarians in Maricopa and Pima counties—the areas most plagued by this dust-borne disease. As you probably know, Valley Fever, or coccicioidomycosis, is a fungus inhaled into the lungs. When disseminated in dogs, the infection spreads to vital organs, bone and skin. The severity of symptoms varies from limping to sudden death. Current treatment with anti-fungal agents such as fluconazole do not entirely rid the dog of infection. And there are negative side effects to these drugs and frequent relapses.

Cactus State Miniature Schnauzer Club has taken it upon itself to appeal to the "dog community" for donations. There are two reasons: Several of our members have recently lost companion animals and show dogs to Valley Fever. The pain and grief caused by this is a strong incentive to action, but another—even better—reason is because THE TIME IS NOW RIPE TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE.

The University of Arizona's Valley Fever Center has acquired the rights to nikkomycin, which may be "curative and thus...reduce or eliminate the incidence of ...dissemination resulting in infection beyond the lungs" (Development Plan for Nikkomycin Z for the Treatment of Coccicioidomycosis, May 2006).

Since Valley Fever is unheard of outside Arizona and certain areas in southern California, New Mexico and Texas, there's a shortage of federal funds to finance clinical trials. It's time the dog community—including corporations, private individuals and nonprofits—came together and gave grassroots support to stopping this dreaded disease.

Please ask your membership to donate as generously as possible.

How to keep your place as pack leader

Dogs are pack animals who need a leader to look up to. As the owner of a dog, you're the pack leader, and both of you need to know your roles. Here's some information on those roles

By about six months of age, most dogs have reached an awkward adolescent stage (some dogs don't reach this stage until their second year.) In this stage, everything you've taught your puppy seems to be forgotten: He won't come, and he wouldn't even think of obeying the commands "sit" or "down".

During this time, the young rascal wants to test his rank, to see whether he can take over as the boss. You have to do a lot of obedience training and put your young dog in his place. It also makes sense to do some obedience training with an adult dog from time to time. Remember, praise is very important.

A dog expects a hierarchy within the family, as well as in a pack. Suppress the first signs of aggression with suitable measures as soon as they manifest themselves. Although it might be amusing to see how your puppy defends his bone, don't tolerate this behavior. Once he's several months old, it can be too late. It can be very tedious to cure him of the aggressive behavior, and it might even be dangerous if you have a big dog.

There are some things you can do to reinforce your position as the pack leader: Take your puppy's dish away sometimes when he's eating. And make sure he gives up chewing bones or play things without complaining. If he growls or even wants to bite, you have to be strict. Lay your dog down on his side. Hold him down with your hand over his neck. Only when your puppy surrenders and relaxes (this can take several minutes in the beginning) can you let go of him. Speak in a comforting tone to him during this time. This dominant soothing, as it is called, can be used any time your puppy misbehaves; for example, when he curls up his lips and threatens while grooming. You're not hurting him when you do this, and it's similar to the behavior an animal with a higher rank in the pack would show to put a younger dog in his place. But let the puppy get up only when you think he should - even if he's struggling desperately.

Gripping the dog's mouth with your hand, done carefully, is also a gesture of dominance among dogs, and serves to strengthen your position. It must be clear to all members of the family that the dog is the last one in the family hierarchy.

In order to thwart the dog's ambitions to climb up the hierarchy, forbid him to sit on the

sofa, for example, or to sleep on the bed, unless you explicitly allow him to.

"Mating" the legs of family members is often misunderstood. It's not a sign of misled sexual behavior, but a sign of dominance. Even female dogs show this behavior with dogs of lesser rank. So you should never tolerate this behavior — particularly with children. Say "no!" in a stern voice. If the behavior occurs again, demonstrate your dominance to the dog by laying him on his side and holding him down. Start these measures early – it's best to begin just after he's become accustomed to his new home. Then, chances are good that your puppy will grow up to be a charming and well-behaved dog.

Of course, it's much more difficult to correct an existing misbehavior than to prevent it from the beginning. Dogs who are not put in their place from the beginning can be a real problem once they are one or two years old. Often they end at an animal shelter or — in the worst case — they must be destroyed when they become a threat to people. However, this will not be the case when you start a consistent training program with your little puppy.

The old-fashioned way of keeping dogs in their place by beating them has fortunately gone out of vogue. Dogs who are beaten tend to be anxious and can start biting from fear. They lose confidence in people. You will achieve more with consistency, praise, and love.

Remember also that it's not just the dog who's a student and has to learn everything. The human must also learn. You must behave in a way that allows the dog to do what he's expected to do.
